**.22 Rifle and .22 Pistol Results from County Fair Shoots**

Twenty-seven Morgan County 4-H members gathered for their County Fair 4-H .22 rifle shoot in July 12 at Muir Springs. Individual champions and place finishers were determined in all .22 rifle and .22 pistol shooting disciplines. The shoot also determined who the county representatives would be at the Colorado State 4-H Shooting Championships in August in Pueblo.

Participants were grouped as juniors (ages 8-13) and seniors (ages 14-18). A total of four different .22 rifle shooting classes were available at both the junior and senior levels. A single contest was held in .22 pistol shooting. The top six participants in each class will comprise the Morgan County team in that class at the state shoot. Should a participant elect to not participate in the state event, the next highest scoring shooter will be asked to join the team in that discipline.
