GENERAL RULES GOVERNING EXHIBITORS AT THE 2026 CROWLEY COUNTY 4-H AND FFA PROGRESS SHOW

ELIGIBILITY: Any child who is a Bonafide member of a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter in Crowley or Otero Counties is eligible to exhibit at the Crowley County Progress Show. Crowley and Otero 4-H'ers had to be enrolled in 4-H by March 1, 2026, to exhibit at the Crowley County Fair. A 4-H Leader or Vocational Ag teacher must sign the entry form to verify that the exhibitor and project are qualified for exhibit. Age is based on 4-H age as of December 31, 2025. Crowley County and Otero County 4-H and FFA members are asked to obtain a minimum of two (2) \$25 sponsors or one (1) \$50 sponsor to exhibit at the Crowley County Progress Show. Otero County 4-H members and FFA members are eligible to exhibit all classes except General and Family Consumer Science.

PREMIUMS: Premium ribbons will only be awarded to general and livestock exhibits. Top 3 places in each home economics and general project class will receive premium and grade ribbons only. **Each class will consist of at least 3 entries, where there are less than three entries, it will be the superintendent's decision to either combine classes or leave as is.** CLASSES SHALL BE ADDED AT JUNIOR FAIRBOARD'S DISCRETION. All Premium monies for general, livestock, and small animal shows will be awarded at the Achievement Banquet. All 4-H members not turning in record books or thank you notes will forfeit all awards and premium monies. Grand Champion award will go to the Reserve Grand Champion winner if record books and thank you notes are not received on time.

Members are required to attend at least one (1) 4-H Council meeting each year for completion. Refer to the 4-H Family Handbook, page 5, for more information.

PROTESTS: All grievances must be brought to the attention of the Superintendent involved as soon as a potential problem arises. The Superintendent will then try to remedy the situation. If the Superintendent is unable to remedy the situation, then the party with the grievance and the Superintendent will contact the CSU Extension Agent and together, they will try to mitigate the situation. If neither the superintendent nor the Extension Agent can successfully mitigate the situation then the party with the grievance is welcome to file a formal protest.

FILING A PROTEST: All protests must be made in writing and filed with the proper Superintendent of the Crowley County Jr Fairboard within 24 hours of the alleged violation. All protests must be accompanied by a \$25.00 cash deposit. Upon receipt of a properly filed protest the Grievance Committee consisting of the Executive Committee of the Crowley County Junior Fairboard, Extension Agent and department superintendent, the 4-H member and the charge against an exhibitor is of an intentional nature with an attempt to misrepresent an exhibit or of any unethical practice, this will result in consequences to the exhibitor. Consequences will include written and/or verbal warning; revocation of awards, premiums, and/or any other benefits; probation for a specified time; removal from participation in an event at the individual's expense and without refund; restitution or repayment of damages; sanctions or bans on participation in future Colorado 4-H Youth Development events; forfeiture of financial support for this event; removal from offices held; initiation of additional action on top of legal consequences; etc. If the protest is not sustained, the deposit shall be forfeited to the CC Junior Fairboard Committee.

- 4. RESPONSIBILITY FOR EXHIBITS: All** exhibits must be owned and cared for by the FFA or 4-H member exhibiting. All care possible will be used to ensure the safety of the entries. However, under no circumstances will the Crowley County Junior Fairboard be responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from any article on exhibition or when left after check-out time. All exhibits are placed on grounds at exhibitor's risk. General exhibits: 4-H members are responsible for picking up their projects on the designated date. The Extension Office will not be responsible for any projects left at the Exhibit Hall.

Code of Conduct: Program participants are expected to abide by the stated rules for the Colorado 4-H Youth Development activities and events including, but not limited to:
Conduct themselves in a courteous, respectful manner, use appropriate language,
Exhibit good sportsmanship and provide a positive role model.
Adhere to program rules, curfews, dress codes, policies and guidelines.
Abstain from illegal and immoral behavior.
Fully participate in scheduled activities.
Respect for property and privacy rights of others.
Refrain from physical, verbal, or emotional abuse or neglect.
Apply rules of safety to individuals, groups and property; and accept personal responsibility for behavior.

Conduct not in keeping with high Colorado 4-H Youth Development standards will not be tolerated. Violation of items listed above will result in consequences to the

participant. Consequences will include written and/or verbal warning; revocation of awards, premiums, and/or any other benefits; probation for a specified time; removal from participation in an event at the individual's expense and without refund; restitution or repayment of damages; sanctions or bans on participation in future Colorado 4-H Youth Development events; forfeiture of financial support for this event; removal from offices held; initiation of additional action on top of legal consequences; etc. Age, office held in Colorado 4-H Youth Development organization, presence of an adult or other perceived status is not grounds for behavior outside of established guidelines. We understand the reason for this agreement is to ensure the safety of the 4-H participants and to ensure conduct and behavior that will result in each participant receiving the full benefit of enjoyment and educational experience from this event. It is not intended to place undue restrictions upon participants. All matters pertaining to conduct will be handled according to the guidelines in the Crowley County Code of Conduct.

ALCOHOL BEVERAGES PROHIBITED: Alcohol beverages consumed by 4-H or FFA members on fairgrounds will not be tolerated. We must always present a good image. Any violation of alcohol on fairgrounds will be handled by local sheriff's department and subject to the Code of Conduct.

RELEASE: General exhibits will be picked up at a designated date and time. Notice will be posted and mailed to participants. If you cannot pick up your project, you can arrange for someone else to do so. We will not be responsible for projects not picked up at the time of release.

No animals will be released until after the species show concludes and all pens are torn down and cleaned.

Projects removed early are subject to loss of awards and premiums and subject to consequences under the Code of Conduct.

9. LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED ONLY UNTIL JUNE 26, 2026 AT A \$25.00 CHARGE PER EXHIBITOR. ABSOLUTELY NO EXCEPTIONS!!!

10. Award letters, thank you notes and livestock, horse, small animal and dog record books due by Sept. 11, 2026.

11. **DRESS CODE:** When showing at the show for judging, round robin, or participating in the gymkhana, please dress neatly in NO t-shirts, halter or tank tops, shorts, tattered or faded jeans. See Colorado Horse Show Rule Book for gymkhana and horse show requirements. White pants and white shirts are appropriate for dairy goats and cattle. Please wear clothing to the show that is attractive and in good taste. The dress code is not subject to personal interpretation and 4-H leaders, agent, advisor or Junior Fair Board member may deem at any time that dress is inappropriate.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

- 1. OWNERSHIP:** The exhibitor or immediate family member must be the Bonafide owner of all animals exhibited. Registration papers and transfers must contain the exhibitor's name and/or the immediate family member's name. Market Animals must be continuously owned and personally cared for by the exhibitor from the official County Tag Day (February – Steers, May – Goats, Lambs, and Pigs). **All other livestock, horses, breeding projects, rabbits and poultry must be owned by exhibitor by May 1st, dogs owned by March 1st of the current year, fryer pen poultry and meat pen rabbits by June 1st and personally cared for by the exhibitor.**

An exhibitor may weigh in two market beef, five goats, five lambs, and five pigs. **BUT the exhibitor can only exhibit two market beef, two goats, two lambs, and two pigs.** A 4-H family may designate family animals; however, each 4-H exhibitor in that family will have access to no more than five animals per species (goat, lambs, pigs). NOTE: they must be in a designated member's name to go to the State Fair. Horse exhibitors must be able to provide proof of ownership upon request of superintendent within two hours of the request. Each horse exhibitor must have a minimum of one horse entered in their name and can enter only one horse as a family designated horse. The exhibitor must designate exactly who is showing the family horse at time of check in.

2. COLORADO 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT POLICY:

Compliance with all Colorado laws prohibiting tampering with or drugging of livestock and/or sale of adulterated meat is mandatory for any 4-H member and/or family member enrolled in a 4-H animal project. If legal charges are brought against any 4-H/FFA member/family, the member/family will be suspended from participation in all 4-H/FFA livestock activities pending resolution of those charges. If found guilty, the 4-H/FFA member/family will be banned from all animal projects by Colorado State University Extension 4-H Youth Development for one year.

All 4-H/FFA members in breeding and market beef, sheep, swine, goats, poultry, rabbits, dairy animal and horse projects must complete Meat Quality Assurance training in the first year you are enrolled in a livestock project and then when you turn 14 years old.

Every 4-H/FFA member who enrolls in a market livestock or breeding animal project will sign a statement indicating their understanding and compliance with the wholesome meat act to protect the integrity of the food chain. The statement must be filed every time the members sign up for a market livestock project. These statements must be kept in file in the county office until the market animal has cleared all slaughter and meat inspections.

All Market animals that are 4-H /FFA projects must be *individually* identified, i.e., ear tags and tattoo.

4-H Humane Animal Care Guidelines will be reviewed and practiced by every person enrolled in or participating in 4-H/FFA animal projects.

3. UNETHICAL PRACTICES: Any violation of the “Code of Conduct” during a Crowley County Fair event is considered an unethical practice. Any violation of the following Competition Requirements regarding fitting of livestock will result in disciplinary action.

Furthermore, the following are termed UNETHICAL PRACTICES: doctoring, doping, tubing, or injecting show animals for body “Fill-ins” or the alteration, changing, defacing or any modification of the markings of show animals and the anatomical structure of an animal, the removal, alteration changing or purposely damaging ear tags or tattoos, any type of injection where oils, glycerin or like substances are used for body “fill-ins”, external applications of such things as liniments and blistering agents that would cause an edematous condition; use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of finish of animal.

Icing animals will not be allowed. Towels immersed in ice water will not be allowed. (Wet towels will be acceptable.) Drench will be allowed with drenching guns, but the use of stomach pumps is prohibited. Changing the color of hair at any point, spot or area above the hock on the animals’ body or addition of any grooming materials that allows color to come off is unacceptable. Altering the structure of hair or wool coat except for trimming and blocking will not be allowed. Adding an artificial tail head or tail fin, artificial poll, or adding any hair or hair-like substance is not allowed. The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited. Exhibitors may use meshed or plastic muzzles on lambs and goats. The style used must allow the animal to drink water. Water must be offered to livestock a minimum of twice daily. Unauthorized removal of a project before release time is considered unethical. No animal shall be decorated with any unnecessary trappings, etc. during the judging.

Any exhibitor found guilty of any of the above listed unethical practices, or any other practice deemed unethical by the Crowley County Junior Fairboard will be subject to consequences listed under the “**Code of Conduct**”. If you have any questions about the legality of anything, ask the Superintendent or the Extension Agent.

ANY EXHIBITOR FOUND TO HAVE VIOLATED ANY OF THE TERMS OR PRACTICES STATED *WILL BE SUBJECT TO DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS BY THE CROWLEY COUNTY JUNIOR FAIRBOARD AND THE CODE OF CONDUCT.* THE DISCIPLINARY ACTION MAY NOT BE LESS THAN STATED ABOVE BUT COULD BE MORE SEVERE.

The management is relying on the 4-H leader to allow only the 4-H members’ 4-H project owned by him to enter the Crowley County Show. 4-H Foundation livestock or sponsored FFA projects may be shown with approval of the Extension Agent or the Vocational Ag Advisor. 4-H and FFA members may not enter the same animal in both breeding and market classes. Animals designated on the show entry form as market cannot be deleted from the market show and added to the breeding show or vice versa after the show entry deadline.

4. CARE AND RESPONSIBILITY FOR ANIMALS: It is the responsibility of the owner of

an animal to see that it is properly cared for while on the fairgrounds. The 4-H/FFA members will provide the primary and continuous care of their project animal from project beginning to completion (ownership period). **Only an animal's owner (a 4-H or FFA member) should prepare their project animal when it is being exhibited at a county show or 4-H show.** If assistance, for safety or education reasons, is needed by a *junior* member, it may be provided by family members, another Colorado 4-H member, or another Colorado 4-H leader. It is recommended that another Colorado 4-H member be the first choice for assistance to a junior member. If assistance is provided, the 4-H members enrolled in the project must be present to benefit from the teaching and instruction.

Senior 4-H/FFA members shall do all the cleaning, grooming, fitting and showing of their livestock animal from enrollment through sale of the animal. It is essential that the senior 4-H/FFA members do all their own cleaning, grooming, fitting and showing of their animals at any show.

The superintendent may ask any member to remove any animal with signs of disease or insect infestation from the grounds.

Each 4-H/FFA member is responsible for the care and feeding of his stock until release time. If, in the opinion of the superintendent, this rule has not been complied with or stock removed from the grounds before release time the committee reserves the right to withhold premium and monies, if any.

UNRULY AND UNMANAGEABLE ANIMALS: Members who bring unruly or unmanageable animals to the fairgrounds may be required by the superintendent to take their animal off the fairgrounds for safety and liability reasons.

5. LIABILITY FOR STOCK: The Crowley County Junior Fairboard, Otero and Crowley Counties 4-H or FFA organizations and its management will not be responsible for any loss or damage or injury to livestock exhibited or for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed or in any way injured.

Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person, whomsoever, by any livestock owned or exhibited by him and shall indemnify the Crowley County Junior Fairboard, Otero and Crowley 4-H and FFA organizations and its managements, against all claims and demands, of any kind or nature that may grow out of any injury occasioned by any negligence of the person in charge of any such livestock.

ANIMAL DEATH & REPLACEMENT: In the unfortunate event that your animal passes away after “beginning weigh and tag” date, you will have a two-week timeframe from the date that it was tagged, to retag a replacement animal. It's important to adhere to this timeline to ensure compliance with livestock identification regulations and avoid any penalties. You must contact the Extension Office immediately following this unfortunate circumstance. Photo of dead animal

with tag in ear and the removed tag must be turned into the office. Replacement animals are not eligible for Rate of Gain Contest.

WEIGHT REQUIREMENTS: Market animals will be officially weighed one time (**no re-weighs**). The exhibitor is responsible and encouraged to verify the weight and ear tags for accuracy once they are posted. **All weight limits have been eliminated for market animals.**

The first two market beef, goats, lambs and pigs that cross the scale are the ones that will be shown.

- 6. SHOW ORDER:** The show order for Wednesday is Dairy Goats, Sheep, Meat Goats, and Swine. Show order for Thursday is Bucket Calf, Beef, Dairy Cattle, and Supreme Exhibitor results. It will be breeding classes, followed by showmanship classes (Senior, then Intermediates, then Juniors), followed by the market classes. Subject to change by judge and superintendents, depending on number of entries.
- 7. NUMBER OF ENTRIES PER CLASS:** All market class exhibitors are limited to two entries. Breeding exhibitors are limited to two entries per class. This rule covers horses, beef, sheep, swine, dairy, goats, poultry and rabbits.
- 8. EARLY RELEASE AND SUBSTITUTE SHOWMAN:** If because of health or a family related conflict, an exhibitor is unable to show his/her animal, another Bonafide 4-H or FFA member can be a substitute showman with permission of the Crowley County Junior Fairboard. (College bound students will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.) All letters must be received by 6:00 p.m., Thursday, July 16, 2026; the night of Barn Set Up/Clean Up. If an animal is sick or injured before fair, members may opt out of showing at CC Days and still qualify to show and sell at Ark Valley Fair. A vet excused absence note, photographs and Jr. Fairboard approval must be on record. Notification to the Extension office as soon as possible is essential.
- 9. STALLING OF LIVESTOCK:** The assignment of pens or stalls will be done by the Extension office and superintendent. Exhibitor must check for assigned pens before stalling stock. **All feed and bedding must be removed from the building by the exhibitor. Clean and neat stalls and alleys are a must and show pride. Please stay after the shows to help tear pens down and clean up the barn and surrounding area.**
- 10. SUPREME EXHIBITOR PARTICIPATION:** Any youth is eligible to participate in the Supreme Exhibitor competition, but must complete all three parts: showmanship, written test, and conformation class (market, breeding, dairy, horse, etc.) The written test will be given at barn cleanup prior to the start of Crowley County Days.
- 11. SHOWMANSHIP:** The showmanship classes will be held at the middle of each livestock show (beef, sheep, swine, horse, goat, dairy). Seniors will show first followed by the Intermediates then Juniors. The showmanship classes will consist of juniors (8-10 yrs. old), intermediates (11-13 yrs. old) and seniors (14 -18 yrs. old). All ages are 4-H age as of December 31, 2025. Grooming and fitting are taken into consideration as well as showing the animal. The individual must have fitted and shown the same animal that is used for showmanship, in either breeding class or

market class.

12. RECORD BOOKS: All horse and livestock record books are due into the Crowley County Extension Office by September 11, 2026. There are two options for record books. The standard record book the exhibitor wants to have graded and compete for the Farm Credit Awards OR to simply turn in your record book for “completion status”. Completion status is needed for project completion and 70% will be needed. **All 4-H/FFA members NOT turning in record books will forfeit all premium monies and awards.**

Late record books or those record books not signed by the 4-H club leader will be considered incomplete, therefore will not be judged. Graded record books will be eligible for the generous awards donated by Farm Credit Services of Southern Colorado for the top 3 placing.

No butt fans, generators or box fans on any species.

Due to the confined space, electrical demands, dust and noise level these items will not be allowed. Please plan accordingly.

It is the advisement of the Jr. Fairboard to quarantine all animals shown for 24 hours following the Crowley County Days Livestock Shows.

BUCKET CALF

1. ALL calves must be orphans which are bottle or bucket fed.
2. The bucket calves must be born after January 1 and before May 1 of current year.
3. The bucket calves may be steers, heifers, or bulls.
4. Dairy and beef breeds will show together.
5. The calves must be shown haltered (Exhibitors do not have to use a show halter in this class).
6. The use of show sticks is not allowed.
7. The calves need to be washed and brushed, but clipping hair on any part of the calf is not allowed.
8. The Bucket Calf project is judged on the following criteria:
 - A. Knowledge of project (Interview judging);
 - B. Tameness of calf;
 - C. Cleanliness and grooming of calf;
 - D. Health and condition of calf;
 - E. Exhibitor showmanship abilities.
9. A limit of one calf can be exhibited at the fair. The calves are not allowed to be sold at the fair.
10. A Bucket Calf record book must be kept by each exhibitor and turned into the Extension Office at the same time as all livestock record books.
11. The calves will be placed and ribbons awarded.
12. Bucket calves may not compete in any other departments.
13. All animals may be mouthed for age at the discretion of the superintendents and will be treated accordingly.

Any youth is eligible to participate in the Supreme Exhibitor competition, but must complete all three parts: showmanship, written test, and conformation class (market or breeding beef, sheep, or swine, dairy cattle or goat, and horse). **The written test will be given at barn set-up prior to the start of Crowley County Days.**

The previous year's Grand Champion Supreme Exhibitor, in Senior, Intermediate or Junior Divisions, sits out of the Supreme Exhibitor competition for one year before competing again. If however, the member won last year as a junior, or intermediate, they can compete again this year as long as they have moved up age divisions.

Participants must designate which *one* animal they wish to compete in the Supreme Exhibitor competition with at the time of fair entry.

The Supreme Exhibitor in each age division will receive a \$25 Grand Champion Award and \$25 cash award. Senior Supreme Exhibitor will also receive a belt buckle, sponsored by the fairboard.

The Cloverbud Project is designed to be a non-competitive event focused on age-appropriate activities for youth. The members must be enrolled by 1st and be active in an organized 4-H Club. Cloverbuds do not enroll in a state or county project, other than the Cloverbud Project. Cloverbuds will need to complete a fair entry form and turn it into the Extension Office no later than June 19, 2026. However, there is no cost. **Please specify on the fair entry form what type of item/items the child will bring for exhibit (i.e.: cookies, poster on dinosaurs, etc.).**

Colorado State University 4-H Youth Development program does not allow youth under the age of eight years old to participate in animal activities or projects. In general, the handling of animals (large or small) requires discipline and motor skills that have yet to be fully developed in most children in the K-2 age range and when coupled with the unpredictable behavior of animals, does not provide the optimal safe educational environment.

No record books are required. The Cloverbud project is a non-competitive membership opportunity in which they will be interviewed by older 4-H members and awarded a certificate of participation, and awards at the Achievement Banquet.

General Rules

1. This division is open to exhibitors who are regularly enrolled 4-H members in Crowley County in the 4-H Family Consumer Science and General Projects by March 1, 2026.
 2. Bona fide members of Colorado 4-H whose project work must be 4-H members own work, and sources must be sited, plagiarism will not be tolerated.
 3. Members' 4-H e-records and supplements (if needed) may be either in pencil, ink or computer, your choice will not affect the judging. These are due at the time of interview judging.
 4. Prior entry is required in all departments. Entries must be in the Crowley County Extension Office by June 19, 2026. ***A \$5.00 entry fee per 4-H member must accompany the entry form. LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED UNTIL JUNE 26, 2026 ALONG WITH A \$25 LATE CHARGE!**
 5. All 4-H Family Consumer Science exhibits and General Projects except Fashion Revue and Dogs & Cats will be judged independently. Every effort should be made to participate in interview judging. Interview will be between judge and 4-Her only. Members not participating in interview judging will not be eligible for Champion or any of the special awards nor will their project be eligible to go the State Fair. If, because of health or a 4-H related conflict, an exhibitor may request permission from the Junior Fairboard Committee for a taped interview. This must be requested by the last regularly scheduled meeting of the Junior Fairboard Committee before the show.
 6. A schedule for the interview judging will be mailed out in advance and also will be available on the website.
 7. Projects will remain at the exhibit/interview site after judging.
 8. All exhibits will be placed in 1st, 2nd, 3rd place group and receive ribbons accordingly. A project receiving unit champion or reserve champion and project grand champion or reserve grand champion will receive all ribbons accordingly.
- No Champions or Reserve Champions will be awarded if it is not worthy. Project cannot receive Champion or Reserve Champion if project does not receive a 1st or 2nd place award ribbon. 1st Place ribbon does not necessarily determine if that project is eligible for State Fair competition, it will be at the judge's discretion.**
9. Exhibits must be removed between 12:00 and 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 25, 2026. No exhibits will be released before then. All exhibits must be picked up on Saturday. If you cannot pick up your project, you can arrange for someone else to do so. The Extension Office will not be responsible for any projects left at the exhibit hall. **If items are taken to the Extension Office, a \$5.00 fee will be charged!**
 10. The decision of the judge will be final in all instances.
 11. The judge may request that the members demonstrate any of the skills learned in any unit.

12. Members enrolled in more than one unit of the same project may exhibit in all units enrolled except where otherwise indicated.
13. The management will not be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits while on display, though it will use all care to ensure their safety.
14. Each county is allowed to send only one exhibit in each unit of Family Consumer Science and General Projects, except Junior Leadership to the State Fair. All entries must be approved by an extension agent.
15. Ages for the Junior, Intermediate and Senior classes are as follows:
Junior: 8–10 years of age, Intermediates: 11–13 years of age, Senior are members 14–18 years old on or before Dec. 31, 2025. Unless otherwise indicated, requirements for Junior, Intermediate and Senior exhibits are the same.
16. Exhibits may not be shown for more than 1 year.
17. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the unit of club work in which they are exhibiting.
18. Projects not meeting the basic exhibit requirements will receive a white ribbon.
- 19. Premium money for home economic entries will be awarded at the Achievement Banquet in October as follows: First place - \$3.00, Second Place - \$2.00, Third Place - \$1.00. Special awards will be given as noted.**
20. Entry labels: Each exhibit and sturdy binder/notebook (containing the e-Record and other materials) is to have a label listing the following: county, exhibitor name and age, department, class and lot numbers. The label needs to be on the top right-hand side of the binder/notebook (outside) and on the exhibit (usually the back of the exhibit). Be sure to read specific instructions on tags for Some exhibits, for example: leathercraft, clothing, heritage arts, etc. All exhibits must be accompanied by completed label.
21. At any time, there is a discrepancy or question, the final say will be the State Fair 4-H Exhibit Requirements.

The project work, including writing, must be the member's own work. If the work was not created by the 4-H member or if it was submitted as a representation of the member's work without proper acknowledgement that it was created by another, then it is considered plagiarism. **Sources must be cited. Plagiarism will result in disqualification.**

Images used in a 4-H project should be a true representation accurate to real life. Images that are AI-generated in all display boards, project notebooks, or e-Records, etc. should be labeled as such. **AI-generated images or text must include a caption or label with this format:**
Image (or Text) generated by *Name of Generative AI tool*, developer, date created and link to the tool.

1. Narration cards are required for Fashion Revue. These are due on or before Aug. 3, 2026, in the Otero Extension Office.
2. Fashion Revue judging will be at 1:30 p.m. and the Public Fashion Revue will be at 7:00 p.m. on August 6, 2025. Location to be determined. Check newsletters and Facebook.
3. Judging will be done by class. Each class will be viewed by the judge as a group. Members will then approach the judge one at a time to be judged. Other class members will stand awaiting their turn. The judge may ask the member to turn, walk, etc. Judge may call back garments as needed for a second viewing to select top awards.
4. There will be 2 judges, and they will judge as a team on all entries.
5. Fashion judging is separate from clothing construction judging.
6. All Clothing Construction, Artistic Clothing, and Heritage Arts members are encouraged to participate in this Revue; however, participation is not required to complete project.
7. ALL GARMENTS AND ACCESSORIES MODELED MUST BE COMPLETED.
8. An "outfit" shall consist of no more than 3 pieces.
9. If a person is entered into more than one division within STEAM 1, 2, or 3, the same outfit may not be worn for more than one division or STEAM (i.e. a blouse worn with a suit in STEAM 3 Synthetics and Rayon cannot be modeled in STEAM 3 Wool Blend unless it is accompanied by a different skirt)
10. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior division.
11. A committee will be selected annually to select a theme, stage decorations, music, etc. for the public review.
12. The Senior Grand Champion and Senior Reserve Grand Champion model will be eligible to go to the State Fair.
13. Judging will be based on the following considerations:
 - A. Preparation:
 1. Design and Style are suited to the individual
 2. Fabric and Color are suitable for the individual and garment
 3. Overall appearance of the outfit
 4. Accessories: Appropriateness
 5. Grooming
 - B. Presentation:

1. Appropriate for garment style
 2. Movement: Ease in walking, standing and turning
 3. Poise/Posture: Head up, graceful, confident
 4. Variety in movement, use of space, creativity
 5. Attitude and enthusiasm
14. Points above are guidelines only. Numerical scores will not be given. The judges will make the final decision.

SHOOTING SPORTS CONTEST

The Otero/Crowley County 4-H Shooting Sports shooting contests will be held July 11-12, 2026 at the La Junta Shooting Range. Registration will be required by June 19, 2026. The 4-H Shooting Sports Events will be held in conjunction with the State Fair, see the State Fair Syllabus for further information.

A shooting sports competition will be held for each unit. Members must shoot the day designated for the contest. No special sessions will be allowed. If, because of health or a 4-H related conflict, an exhibitor may request permission for an exception from the Junior Fairboard. This must be requested by the last regularly scheduled meeting of the Junior Fairboard before the Shooting Sports Competition.

RULES:

1. Competitors must be currently enrolled in 4-H Shooting Sports project.
2. Every competitor must possess a valid Colorado Hunters Education Card, regardless of the competition category. A photo copy of the Colorado Hunters Education Card must be on file at the Extension Office before any shooting is allowed.
3. To compete in the Shooting Sports Competition a member must have proof of meeting the safety training requirement and minimum practice requirements. A member must attend one classroom safety meeting with an authorized leader and must demonstrate that they are proficient in the safety rules and practices.

Safety Training Requirements

- One range safety meeting

Minimum Required Range Practice

- Minimum of one (1) practice per discipline for those shooting multiple disciplines
4. A Certified Shooting Sports Leader will sign the member's shooting e-record when these requirements are met.
 5. Refer to the current State 4-H Shooting Sports Rule Book for specific details regarding equipment, ammunition, and classes of shooting sports competition. <http://co4h.colostate.edu/program-areas/shooting-sports/>
 6. A parent or legal guardian MUST be present for the 4-Her to shoot.
 7. No member will be allowed to shoot at any Crowley/Otero County 4-H sponsored event without a certified shooting sports leader certified in that discipline present.
 8. To participate in the State Fair Shooting Contest you must complete both a display and/or Stand-Alone at County Fair and qualify in the County Shoot. Shooting Sports display board or stand alone project and a record book must be State Fair quality per the judge's opinion for the member to participate in the State Shooting Sports Contest. To compete in the State Shoot the overall score of the participant must be State Fair quality per the judge's opinion for the member to participate in the State Shooting Sports Contest.

The state fair syllabus and Colorado 4-H shooting sports rule book will be followed on all other rules and regulations.

Display Board Guidelines for Fair 4-H Exhibits

Display boards are a great way to share information, but when viewers walk by, they spend only 60-90 seconds looking at each display board. Make your board stand out by highlighting the main points of your project in a fun, interesting way.

(4-H specialists/coordinators will print and attach a FairEntry display card to each exhibit that qualifies for State Fair.)

Follow these guidelines to create a display board for the fair.

TEXT

Make sure that all the text on your display is easy to read. Use a large font for the title, and smaller fonts for the headings and body text.

Text must be readable from 3-5 feet away. Use large bold letters. Dark letters on a light background works best.

SHAPE

Design your exhibit so information fits on the display. Remember, you have one large surface, and two smaller side wings. Do not use additional panels to brace the board.

ATTACHMENTS

Make sure pictures and objects are securely attached to the board. Use glue for pictures and paper, and consider wires, zip ties, or staples to attach bulkier items. No sharp points please! Make sure they are taped over.

Do not attach items that are so heavy that your board can't stand or fold.

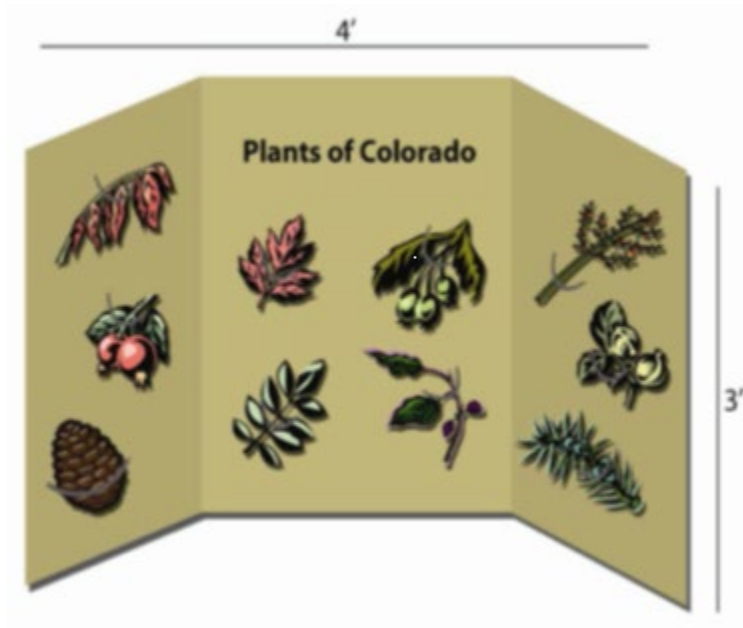
SPACE

Your display should only discuss one main topic. This will help it look neat and uncrowded

SIZE

Display boards for the state fair must measure 4 ft. wide x 3 ft. tall. They should be made of lightweight cardboard but not poster board. Pre-cut boards are available at most craft and shopping centers.

No part of your display may extend beyond these boundaries. Do not use additional panels to brace the board.



DISPLAY BOOKS

Your e-Record book should accompany your board. You may use 3-ring binders or other notebooks that will keep the pages securely inside. You may not use slider-type binders.

State Fair Qualifiers-Office staff will place a label printed from FairEntry with the following information in the upper right-hand corner of the front cover: Name, County, Project Area, Class, 4-H Age Division. Note: This label should be used for cakes and foods projects and be placed on top of the cake board or plate.
