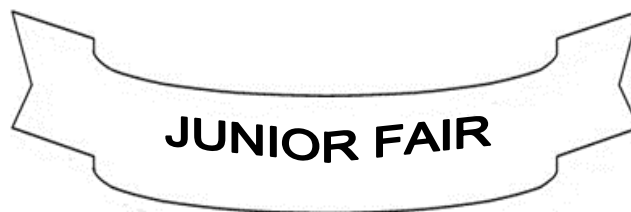

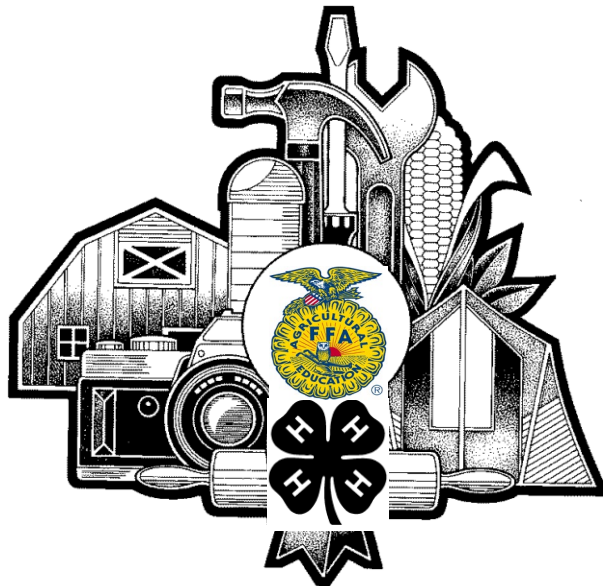

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GENERAL RULES GOVERNING 4-H AND FFA EXHIBITORS AT THE ARKANSAS VALLEY FAIR

1. ELIGIBILITY:

Any boy or girl who is a member of a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter in Otero or Crowley Counties is eligible to exhibit at the Arkansas Valley Fair.

4-H Members

Otero and Crowley County 4-Hers must be enrolled in 4-H by March 1st of the current year to be eligible to exhibit at the Arkansas Valley Fair.

FFA Members

Otero and Crowley County FFA members must be current year FFA members.

4-H or FFA members who have sold or plan to sell a market animal at any County Fair, other than the Arkansas Valley Fair, in this calendar year are ineligible to enter a market animal in the Arkansas Valley Fair.

2. ENTRIES:

Entry Forms are due by the entry deadline. A 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor must sign the entry form to verify that the exhibitor and project are qualified for exhibit. Age is based on 4-H age (Seniors are 14 and over, Intermediate are 11-13 years old, while Juniors are 10 and under) on or before December 31, of the previous year.

Crowley County 4-H and FFA members are eligible to compete in livestock breeding and market classes as well as AG Mechanics at the Arkansas Valley Fair and to sell at the fat stock sale if they have shown a market animal of the same species at Crowley County Days.

ENTRY FEE:

A \$10.00 entry fee per exhibitor must accompany fair entries by the entry due date.

3. LATE ENTRIES:

Late entries will be charged a \$25.00 per exhibitor late fee, this is in addition to the entry fee. All late fees are due with entry. Deadline for late entries is July 31st.

4. CODE OF CONDUCT:

Program participants are expected to abide by the state guidelines for Colorado 4-H and FFA activities and events.

- Conduct themselves in a courteous, respectful manner, use appropriate language and exhibit good sportsmanship.
- Adhere to program rules, curfews, dress codes, policies and guidelines.

Conduct not adhering to the standards will not be tolerated. Violation will result in consequences for the participant. This may include written and/or verbal warning; revocation of awards, premiums, and/or any other benefits; probation for a specified time; removal at the individual's expense and without refund; restitution or repayment of damages; sanctions or bans on participation at the Arkansas Valley Fair.

5. DRUG & ALCOHOL PROHIBITED:

Use of alcohol, marijuana, illegal or illicit drugs by a 4-H or FFA member on fairgrounds will not be tolerated. Any violation will be handled by the local police department.

6. DRESS CODE:

When participating in any formal activities or competitions at the Fair, please dress neatly in clothes that are clean and in good repair, free of holes, tears or slashes. Clothes must be free from violent or drug related material. All items designated as underwear are kept under cover. No halter-tops, tube tops or tops that expose undergarments. No pants that expose undergarments. No spaghetti straps on shirts. No see-through garments or muscle shirts. All shorts, skorts, and skirts must be no shorter than fingertip length. See Colorado Horse Show Rule Book for horse show requirements. White pants & white shirt are appropriate for dairy goats & cattle. Please wear clothing to the show and the sale that are attractive and in good taste. This dress code is not subject to personal interpretation. Any member of the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show may deem clothing inappropriate.

7. RESPONSIBILITY FOR EXHIBITS:

All exhibits must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor. Horse ownership will follow the Colorado 4-H Horse Show Rules. All care possible will be exercised to ensure the safety of entries. However, under no circumstances will the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show be responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from any project on exhibition or when left after check-out time. All exhibits are placed on grounds at exhibitor's risk.

8. RELEASE:

All "NON-FLOOR PLAN" animals may go home at the completion of that species show. But once they leave, they will not be allowed to return to the Fairgrounds. All Floor Plan and sale animals must remain on the grounds. Tack and personal items can be removed at any time "EXCEPT" on Sale Day from 3:00 PM until the conclusion of the Fat Stock/Food Sale.

All other animals will be released on the following Saturday, between 8:00 and 11:00 am. You MUST clean your pen and area and help tear down pens, if you do not a penalty may apply. If you are not able to do so on Saturday, you will be responsible for finding someone to take care of this for you.

Removing projects from fairgrounds before posted release and without permission is considered an unethical practice.

Superintendents are responsible for release and checkout of their specific species. General Project Exhibitors are responsible for picking up their projects at the designated time and date as advertised in the July and August 4-H Newsletters. The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show, FFA Advisors or the Extension Office Staff will not be responsible for any projects left at the Fairgrounds. All projects must be picked up and all stalls cleaned by the scheduled release time.

9. PROTESTS:

All grievances must be brought to the attention of the Superintendent involved as soon as a potential problem arises. The Superintendent will then try to remedy the situation. If the Superintendent is unable to remedy the situation, then the party with the grievance and the Superintendent shall contact the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show and together, they will try to mitigate the situation. If neither the Superintendent nor the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show is

able to successfully mitigate the situation then the party with the grievance is welcome to file a formal protest.

10. FILING A PROTEST:

All protests must be made in writing and filed with the proper Superintendent of the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show in the Junior Livestock Show Office within 24 hours after the alleged violation. All protests must be accompanied by a \$25.00 cash deposit. Upon receiving a properly filed protest the Grievance Committee consisting of the Executive Committee of the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show, Extension Agent or FFA Advisor, Department Superintendent, the exhibitor and parent filing the protest and/or the exhibitor and parent the protest is against will review the protest and render a decision. If the protest is found valid and the charge against an exhibitor is of an intentional nature with an attempt to misrepresent an exhibit or of any unethical practice, this will result in consequences to the exhibitor. This may be written and/or verbal warning; revocation of awards, premiums, and/or any other benefits; probation for a specified time; removal from participation in an event at the individual's expense and without refund; restitution or repayment of damages; sanctions or bans on participation in future Colorado 4-H Youth Development events or Colorado FFA events; forfeiture of financial support for this event; removal from offices held; initiation of additional action on top of legal consequences; etc. If the protest is not sustained, the deposit shall be forfeited to the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show.

There will be a final appeals committee consisting of one Extension Specialist, one FFA Advisor, one Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show Member and two unaffiliated individuals to handle conflicts that cannot be decided using the traditional grievance process.

PREMIUMS

Top 3 places in each class, including showmanship, will receive premiums. Each class will consist of 3 entries, when there are less than three entries, it will be the superintendent's decision to combine classes or leave as is.

Large Animals

SUPERINTENDENTS

Superintendents may add, delete or combine classes at their discretion. The order for the shows will be determined by the Superintendent.

SHOWMANSHIP

Each species will have a showmanship contest. Animals must be entered in either a market or breeding class to be eligible to be shown in showmanship. Showmanship contestants must own and exhibit their own livestock unless they have been awarded an exemption from Arkansas Valley

Fair Livestock Show. Exhibitors that do not have an animal make weight in a species may show one, underweight, animal in a showmanship class. Grooming and fitting are taken into consideration as well as showing the animal. The Champion Showman in each species is expected to show in the Round Robin. YOU MUST NOTIFY THE SHOW OFFICE IF YOU ARE NOT GOING TO BE IN THE ROUND ROBIN.

LARGE ANIMAL ROUND ROBIN

The first-place winners in each of the Senior, Intermediate and Junior divisions of Showmanship of each large animal species are eligible to compete in the Round Robin.

Round Robin participants must provide the animals for Round Robin. Individuals must show and fit their own animal. If an exhibitor wins showmanship in more than one species, they must notify the fair office as soon as possible as to which species they are going to use in the Round Robin.

The second-place individual will then become eligible in the vacated species.

FAT STOCK SALE

1. All stock offered for sale must be entered and shown at the current year Arkansas Valley Fair.
2. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market beef, goats, lambs, pigs and Beef County Born and Raised winners **MUST SELL** in the sale.
3. Market Poultry (pen of fryer chickens, pen of broilers, single fryers, market waterfowl and market turkeys) and Market Rabbits (meat pen and single fryer), **MAY SELL** in the sale.
4. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Food Projects in each age division **MAY SELL**. If the Grand Champion or the Reserve chose to **NOT** sell, the 3rd place project may sell. Foods items auction must be freshly prepared, be a full and exact recipe of the item that was exhibited at the fair and be presented in an attractive manner. Food items will be sold through the sale ring.
5. Exhibitors that have multiple Grand / Reserve Grand Champions in the **MUST SELL** category (beef, goat, sheep, swine) are allowed to sell **multiple projects**. All other sellers are limited to one auction item.
6. An exhibitor with a **MAY SELL** Grand / Reserve Champion may elect to not sell that project in the Fat Stock Sale. A Sale Waiver must be signed by the exhibitor and their legal guardian within 30 minutes of the last market animal show.
7. All projects sold at the Fat Stock Sale will be sold by the project.

8. Show weights will be used for sale weights up to 160 lbs. for lambs, 110 lbs. for goats and 290 lbs. for swine.
9. The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show reserves the right to mark the animals before or after the sale in any manner they desire.
10. The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show will not be held liable for any breach of contract between the seller and the buyer.
11. All sale cattle must undergo brand inspection at weigh-in time. The exhibitor is required to have proof of ownership (Bill of Sale) in his possession at the time of weigh-in to satisfy the brand laws of the State of Colorado.
12. A commission will be levied against the premium portion of all stock sold in the Fat Stock Sale. There will not be commission on the floor plan price of the animals.
13. The Market Price for all livestock will be posted in the show barn prior to the sale and announced at the sale.
14. All animals that are sold through the Fat Stock Sale must be floor planned. The buyer still has the option of keeping the animal if he wants to pay the floor price. Animals not sold through the sale may be taken home or floor planned. Buyers who want to buy back the animal must report to the salesclerk their decision on the night of the sale. If nothing is heard from the buyer on the night of the sale, the animal will be floor planned.
15. Every animal that is floor planned but not sold through the sale will be assessed a charge of \$10.00 on beef, \$5.00 on hogs and \$3.00 on sheep and market goats.
16. The sale is "Blow and Go", no paint, glitter or adhesive allowed.

Sale Order: The Sale Order is on a rotation basis, with the species selling last moving to the first and the beef remaining in the middle. The order for each species shall be Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the species, Champion and Reserve Champion, County Born and Raised beef, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th place, Rate of Gain for each species then the balance of the animals will be drawn for sale order by the Sale Committee. (The buyer has the option of keeping the animal if he wants to pay the floor plan price. Once an animal leaves the grounds it cannot return for any reason.)

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

1. OWNERSHIP:

Market Animals must be owned by the exhibitor from the official County Tag Day (February – Steers, May – Goats, Lambs & Pigs). All other livestock must be owned by exhibitor by June 1, with the exception of rabbit and poultry and personally cared for by the exhibitor. An exhibitor may tag an unlimited number of market beef, goats, lambs, or pigs.

4-H or FFA family may designate family animals. NOTE: They must be in a designated members' name to go to State Fair. Exhibitors can exhibit three market beef, goats, lambs or pigs. ALL ANIMALS MUST BE TAGGED BY THE OFFICIAL COUNTY TAG DAY. NO LATE TAGGING!

The exhibitor must be the bona fide owner of all animals exhibited. Registration papers and transfers must contain the exhibitor's name.

Horse exhibitors must have had the major responsibility for the management, care and training of the horse during the club year. Each horse exhibitor must have a minimum of one horse entered in their name and can enter only one horse designated as a family horse. The exhibitor must designate the family horse at the time of check-in as to which family member will be showing the family horse.

2. DEATH OF A MARKET ANIMAL:

In the unfortunate event that your animal passes away after the "beginning weigh and tag date", you will have a two-week timeframe from the date that it was tagged, to retag a replacement animal. It's important to adhere to this timeline to ensure compliance with livestock identification regulations and avoid any penalties. You must contact the Extension Office immediately following this unfortunate circumstance.

3. UNETHICAL PRACTICES:

Any violations of the "Code of Conduct" during an Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show event are considered an unethical practice. Any violation of the following Competition Requirements regarding fitting of livestock will result in disciplinary action. Furthermore, the following are termed UNETHICAL PRACTICES: doctoring, doping, tubing or injecting show animals for body "Fill-ins" or the alteration, changing defacing or any modification of the markings of show animals and the anatomical structure of an animal, the removal, alteration, changing or purposely damaging official ear tags, any type of injection where oils, glycerin or like substances are used for body "fill-ins", external applications of such things as liniments and blistering agents that would cause an edematous condition; use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of finish of the animal. Icing animals will not be allowed. Towels immersed in ice water will not be allowed. (Wet towels only will be acceptable.) Drenching will be allowed with drench guns, but the use of stomach pumps is prohibited. Changing the color of hair at any point, spot or area above the hock on the animals' body or addition of any grooming materials that allows color to come off is unacceptable. Altering the structure of hair or wool coat except for trimming and blocking will not be allowed.

Adding an artificial tail head or tail fin, artificial poll, or adding any hair or hair-like substance is not allowed. The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited. Exhibitors may use meshed or plastic muzzles on lambs and goats. The style used must allow the animal to drink water. Water must be offered to livestock a minimum of twice daily.

Unauthorized removal of a project before release time is considered unethical.

No animal shall be decorated with any unnecessary trapping, etc. during the judging. If you have any questions about the legality of anything, ask the Superintendent.

ANY EXHIBITOR FOUND TO HAVE VIOLATED ANY OF THE TERMS OR PRACTICES STATED IN #3 UNETHICAL PRACTICES WILL BE SUBJECT TO DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS BY THE ARKANSAS VALLEY FAIR LIVESTOCK SHOW. THE DISCIPLINARY ACTION MAY NOT BE LESS THAN STATED ABOVE BUT COULD BE MORE SEVERE.

COLORADO 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT POLICY:

A. Compliance with all Colorado laws prohibiting tampering with or drugging of livestock and/or sale of adulterated meat is mandatory for any 4-H/FFA member and/or family member enrolled in a 4-H/FFA animal project. If legal charges are brought against any 4-H/FFA member/family, the member/family will be suspended from participation in all 4-H/FFA livestock activities pending

resolution of those charges. If found guilty, the 4-H/FFA member/family will be banned from all animal projects by Colorado State University Extension 4-H Youth Development for one year.

B. Otero County in conjunction with the Southeast Area 4-H programs where youth have enrolled in Livestock/Horse projects will annually provide a Meat Quality Assurance (MQA) program. Members will be required to attend MQA training the first year they show livestock and then must recertify at the beginning of their Intermediate (age 11) and Senior (age 14) years. This is assuming that you start 4-H when you are eight years old. If a member does not start taking livestock/horse project until later, they must still take the initial first year and then whenever the next age break fits in.

****This includes ALL Breeding and Market Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, all Dairy Animals and Horse.**

C. Every 4-H member who enrolls in a livestock market or breeding animal project will sign a statement indicating their understanding and compliance with the wholesome meat act to protect the integrity of the food chain. This statement will be turned in when animals are checked in at the Fair. These statements must be kept in file in the county office until the market animal has cleared all slaughter and meat inspections.

D. All market animals that are 4-H/FFA projects must be individually identified, i.e. County ear tags.

E. 4-H Humane Animal Care Guidelines will be reviewed and practiced by every person enrolled in or participating in 4-H/FFA animal projects.

F. Animal Care & Housing Form must be up to date and on file at the Extension Office at time of Enrollment.

4. CARE AND RESPONSIBILITY FOR ANIMALS:

It is the responsibility of the owner of an animal to see that it is properly cared for while on the fairgrounds. Exhibitors must be in attendance for general care, clipping, grooming and fitting their animals while exhibiting at the fair.

The superintendent, in consultation with a veterinarian, may ask any 4-H or FFA member to remove any animal with signs of disease or insect infestation from the grounds. Any injections or medications administered to livestock on the fairgrounds must be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

Animals may be removed or disqualified based on animal body condition score. This decision will be made by a panel of Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show members with consultation of a licensed veterinarian.

The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show MAY drug test Grand Champion and/or Reserve Grand Champion animals.

All livestock will remain the property and title of the seller until it is loaded for delivery to the buyer or the release time for exhibits, whichever comes first.

5. UNRULY AND UNMANAGABLE ANIMALS:

Owners of unruly or unmanageable animals will be required by the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show to take their animals off the fairgrounds for safety and liability reasons. Any animal required to leave will not be eligible to show or sell.

6. LIABILITY FOR STOCK:

The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show, Otero and Crowley Counties 4-H or FFA organizations and its management will not be responsible for any loss, damage or injury to livestock exhibited, for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed, or in any way injured. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person, whomsoever, by any livestock owned or exhibited by him/her and shall indemnify the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show, Otero and Crowley Counties 4-H or FFA organizations and its managements, against all claims and demands of any kind or nature that may grow out of any injury occasioned by any negligence of the person in charge of any such livestock.

7. WEIGHT REQUIREMENTS:

Market animals will only be officially weighed once (no re-weighs). The exhibitor is responsible and encouraged to verify the weight and ear tags for accuracy once they are posted. There will be a minimum show weight limit for the large market animals but NO maximum limit for exhibition in market classes. There will be a maximum weight limit as it pertains to the floor plan payment apart from market steers and heifers.

The first three entries of steers, goats, lambs and pigs, and the first two rabbit/poultry entries that cross the scale and make weight, are the ones that will be shown. Any market animals under these weights will only be eligible for showmanship classes.

ALL EXHIBITORS OF MARKET BEEF, GOATS, SHEEP, SWINE, POULTRY AND RABBITS MUST CHOOSE, AT THE TIME OF WEIGH-IN, FOR EACH OF THESE ANIMALS, ONE OF THE FOLLOWING OPTIONS:

1. SELL THE ANIMAL AT THE FAT STOCK SALE
2. FLOOR PLAN THE ANIMAL
3. TAKE THE ANIMAL HOME

EXHIBITORS HAVE THIRTY MINUTES AFTER THE FINAL MARKET SHOW TO CHANGE WHICH ANIMAL THEY HAD ORIGINALLY DESIGNATED TO FLOOR PLAN, SELL OR TAKE HOME. ALL ANIMALS THAT ARE SOLD THROUGH THE FAT STOCK SALE MUST BE FLOOR PLANNED!

8. EARLY RELEASE:

Early release of any project or entry can only be obtained for health, 4-H, FFA or College related reasons by written permission of the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show. Removing projects from fairgrounds before release is considered an unethical practice.

9. SUBSTITUTE SHOWMAN:

If an exhibitor is unable to show or sell his/her animal due to a health issue or a 4-H, FFA or College conflict then another bona fide 4-H or FFA member can substitute with permission of the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show.

10. STALLING OF LIVESTOCK:

ALL MARKET AND BREEDING LIVESTOCK, POULTRY AND RABBITS MUST BE ON THE FAIRGROUNDS BY THE START OF OFFICIAL WEIGH-IN. The assignment of pens or stall will be made by the superintendent. Exhibitor must check for assigned pens before stalling stock. Swine bedding must be in the stall prior to the hogs. All feed and bedding must be removed from the building by the exhibitor.

All "NON-FLOOR PLAN" animals may go home at the completion of that species show. But once they leave, they will not be allowed to return to the Fairgrounds. All Floor Plan and sale animals must remain on the grounds. Tack and personal items can be removed at any time "EXCEPT" on Friday, from 3:00 PM until the conclusion of the Fat Stock/Food Sale.

All other animals will be released on Saturday, between 8:00 and 11:00 am. You MUST clean your pen and area and help tear down pens, if this is not done a penalty may apply. If you cannot do so on Saturday, you will be responsible for finding someone to take care of this for you.

The Supreme Champion will be awarded in Market Beef, Goat, Sheep and Swine with all age divisions competing in a combined contest. The test will be specific to species and age division (Junior, Intermediate, Senior). Showmanship placing is based on placing within respective age division for members.

It is NOT mandatory that all members participate in the Supreme Champion Program and they may

participate only in certain categories, if they wish.

A project must be exhibited at the Arkansas Valley Fair to be eligible for the Supreme Champion program.

Each exhibitor may designate two animals in each of the following species: Market Beef, Market Swine, Market Lamb and Market Goat. The designation must be made at time of entry weigh-in at the Arkansas Valley Fair.

Small Animals**SUPERINTENDENTS:**

Superintendents may add, delete or combine classes at their discretion. The order for the shows will be determined by the Superintendent.

SHOWMANSHIP:

Each species will have a showmanship contest. Animals must be entered in either a market or breeding class to be eligible to be shown in showmanship. Showmanship contestants must own and exhibit their own livestock unless they have been awarded an exemption from Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show. Exhibitors that do not have an animal make weight in a species may show one, underweight, animal in a showmanship class. Grooming and fitting are taken into consideration as well as showing the animal.

FAT STOCK SALE:

1. All stock offered for sale must be entered and shown at the current year Arkansas Valley Fair.
2. Market Poultry (pen of fryer chickens, pen of broilers, single fryers, market waterfowl and market turkeys) and Market Rabbits (meat pen and single fryer), MAY SELL in the sale.

3. Exhibitors that have multiple Grand / Reserve Grand Champions in the MUST SELL category (beef, goat, sheep, swine) are allowed to sell multiple projects. All other sellers are limited to one auction item.
4. An exhibitor with a MAY SELL Grand / Reserve Champion may elect not to sell that project in the Fat Stock Sale.
5. Poultry, Turkeys, Waterfowl and Rabbits are sold by the head.
6. The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show reserves the right to mark the animals before or after the sale in any manner they desire.
7. The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show will not be held liable for any breaches of contract between the seller and the buyer.
8. A commission will be levied against the premium portion of all stock sold in the Fat Stock Sale. There will not be commission on the floor plan price of the animals.
9. The Market Price for all livestock will be posted in the show barn prior to the sale and announced at the sale.
10. All animals that are sold through the Fat Stock Sale must be floor planned. The buyer still has the option of keeping the animal if he wants to pay the floor price. Animals not sold through the sale may be taken home or floor planned. Buyers who want to buy back the animal must report to the salesclerk their decision on the night of the sale. If nothing is heard from the buyer on the night of the sale, the animal will be floor planned.

Sale Order: The Sale Order is on a rotation basis, with the species selling last moving to the first and the beef remaining in the middle. The order for each species shall be Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the species, Champion and Reserve Champion, County Born and Raised beef, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th place, Rate of Gain for each species then the balance of the animals will be drawn for sale order by the Sale Committee. (The buyer has the option of keeping the animal if he wants to pay the floor plan price. Once an animal leaves the grounds it cannot return for any reason.)

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

1. OWNERSHIP:

All animals and birds must be personally cared for by the exhibitor.

4-H or FFA family may designate family animals. NOTE: They must be in a designated members' name to go to State Fair.

The exhibitor must be the bona fide owner of all animals exhibited. Registration papers and transfers must contain the exhibitor's name.

All rabbits must be tattooed.

2. UNETHICAL PRACTICES:

Any violations of the "Code of Conduct" during an Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show event are considered an unethical practice. Any violation of the following Competition Requirements regarding fitting of livestock will result in disciplinary action. Furthermore, the following are termed UNETHICAL PRACTICES: doctoring, doping, tubing or injecting show animals for body "Fill-ins" or the

alteration, changing defacing or any modification of the markings of show animals and the anatomical structure of an animal, Changing the color of hair at any point, spot or area above the hock on the animals' body or addition of any grooming materials that allows color to come off is unacceptable.

The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited. Unauthorized removal of a project before release time is considered unethical.

ANY EXHIBITOR FOUND TO HAVE VIOLATED ANY OF THE TERMS OR PRACTICES STATED IN #2 *UNETHICAL PRACTICES*, WILL BE SUBJECT TO DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS BY THE ARKANSAS VALLEY FAIR LIVESTOCK SHOW. THE DISCIPLINARY ACTION MAY NOT BE LESS THAN STATED ABOVE BUT COULD BE MORE SEVERE.

COLORADO 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT POLICY:

A. Compliance with all Colorado laws prohibiting tampering with or drugging of livestock and/or sale of adulterated meat is mandatory for any 4-H/FFA member and/or family member enrolled in a 4-H/FFA animal project. If legal charges are brought against any 4-H/FFA member/family, the member/family will be suspended from participation in all 4-H/FFA livestock activities pending resolution of those charges. If found guilty, the 4-H/FFA member/family will be banned from all animal projects by Colorado State University Extension 4-H Youth Development for one year.

B. Otero County in conjunction with the Southeast Area 4-H programs where youth have enrolled in Poultry or Rabbit projects will annually provide a Meat Quality Assurance (MQA) program. Members will be required to attend MQA training the first year they show livestock and then must recertify at the beginning of their Intermediate (age 11) and Senior (age 14) years. This is assuming that you start 4-H when you are eight years old. If a member does not start taking livestock/horse project until later, they must still take the initial first year and then whenever the next age break fits in.

****This includes ALL Breeding and Market Poultry and Rabbits.**

C. Every 4-H member who enrolls in a market or breeding project will sign a statement indicating their understanding and compliance with the wholesome meat act to protect the integrity of the food chain. This statement will be turned in when animals are checked in at the Fair. These statements must be kept on file in the county office until the market animal has cleared all slaughter and meat inspections.

D. All market animals that are 4-H/FFA projects must be individually identified, i.e. County ear tags.

E. 4-H Humane Animal Care Guidelines will be reviewed and practiced by every person enrolled in or participating in 4-H/FFA animal projects.

F. Animal Care & Housing Form must be up to date and on file at the Extension Office at time of Enrollment.

3. CARE AND RESPONSIBILITY FOR ANIMALS:

It is the responsibility of the owner of an animal to see that it is properly cared for while on the fairgrounds. Exhibitors must be in attendance for general care, clipping, grooming and fitting their animals while exhibiting at the fair.

The superintendent, in consultation with a veterinarian, may ask any 4-H or FFA member to remove any animal with signs of disease or insect infestation from the grounds. Any injections or medications administered to livestock on the fairgrounds must be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

Animals may be removed or disqualified based on animal body condition score. This decision will be made by a panel of Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show members with consultation of a licensed veterinarian.

The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show MAY drug test Grand Champion and/or Reserve Grand Champion animals.

All livestock will remain the property and title of the seller until it is loaded for delivery to the buyer or the release time for exhibits, whichever comes first.

4. LIABILITY FOR STOCK: The Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show, Otero and Crowley Counties 4-H or FFA organizations and its management will not be responsible for any loss, damage or injury to livestock exhibited, for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed, or in any way injured. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person, whomsoever, by any livestock owned or exhibited by him/her and shall indemnify the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show, Otero and Crowley Counties 4-H or FFA organizations and its managements, against all claims and demands of any kind or nature that may grow out of any injury occasioned by any negligence of the person in charge of any such livestock.

5. WEIGHT REQUIREMENTS: Market animals will only be officially weighed one time (no re-weighs). The exhibitor is responsible and encouraged to verify the weight and leg bands/tattoos for accuracy once they are posted.

The first two rabbit/poultry entries that cross the scale and make weight, are the ones that will be shown. Any market animals under these weights will only be eligible for showmanship classes. See each individual market class for specific weights.

ALL EXHIBITORS OF POULTRY AND RABBITS MUST CHOOSE, AT THE TIME OF WEIGH-IN, FOR EACH OF THESE ANIMALS, ONE OF THE FOLLOWING OPTIONS:

1. SELL THE ANIMAL AT THE FAT STOCK SALE
2. FLOOR PLAN THE ANIMAL
3. TAKE THE ANIMAL HOME

EXHIBITORS HAVE THIRTY MINUTES AFTER THE FINAL MARKET SHOW TO CHANGE WHICH ANIMAL THEY HAD ORIGINALLY DESIGNATED TO FLOOR PLAN, SELL OR TAKE HOME. ALL ANIMALS THAT ARE SOLD THROUGH THE FAT STOCK SALE MUST BE FLOOR PLANNED!

6. EARLY RELEASE: Early release of any project or entry can only be obtained for health, 4-H, FFA or College related reasons by written permission of the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show. Removing projects from fairgrounds before release is considered an unethical practice.

7. SUBSTITUTE SHOWMAN: If an exhibitor is unable to show or sell his/her animal due to a health issue or a 4-H, FFA or College conflict then another bona fide 4-H or FFA member can substitute with permission of the Arkansas Valley Fair Livestock Show.

8. STALLING OF LIVESTOCK: ALL MARKET AND BREEDING POULTRY AND RABBITS MUST BE ON THE FAIRGROUNDS BY THE START OF OFFICIAL WEIGH-IN. The assignment of pens will be made by the superintendent. Exhibitors must check for assigned pens before stalling. All feed and bedding must be removed from the building by the exhibitor.

9. ENTRIES: When completing entries for the Arkansas Valley Fair, enter the class name and each animal to be exhibited on entry form. Poultry leg band numbers or Rabbit tattoos will be used as identification. Superintendents will divide entries into appropriate classes.

POULTRY

All market and breeding poultry MUST be on the fairgrounds prior to official poultry weigh-in.

*****Late check-ins will NOT be allowed to exhibit.*****

ALL ENTRIES MUST BE COMPLETED PRIOR TO THE OFFICIAL COUNTY DEADLINE. NO ENTRIES WILL BE ALLOWED AT WEIGH-IN. Entry scratches must be complete within one hour of weigh-in.

ALL POULTRY MUST HAVE LEG BANDS ON AT THE TIME OF CHECK-IN / WEIGH-IN. Bands are available for loan from the Otero County Extension Office.

All Poultry are subject to inspection upon arrival by the superintendent. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to make sure the poultry are free of external parasites, nasal discharge or obvious illness. Any animal identified to be positive for parasites, nasal discharge or illness must be removed from the fairgrounds immediately and is not eligible to participate in the Ark Valley Fair. Each bird may be entered in only 1 class.

This means that if you choose to show a Trio, these birds may not be entered into a single class. All poultry will be judged according to the current Poultry Standard of Perfection.

Young birds and Market Chickens must have been raised/owned by the 4-H/FFA Exhibitor by the market poultry age deadline (see Market Poultry section). Aged birds must be owned by the exhibitor as of June 1st of the current year or before.

The first 2 entries/pens that cross the scale and make weight are the ones to be shown. NO RE-WEIGHS ALLOWED. You can pre-weigh a market poultry in the poultry/rabbit barn before crossing the official scales. (Ask the poultry superintendents for assistance).

There must be three entries per class in at least two classes for a separate Divisional Championship to be held, otherwise a Champion Large Breed and a Champion Bantam will be selected and compete for overall Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Bird of Show.

The Cloverbud Project is a carefully designed, non-competitive, curriculum focused on age-appropriate developmental activities for youth. The children must be enrolled in the 4-H Cloverbud Program through an organized 4-H club.

The primary objective of the Cloverbud Project is to provide young children with the opportunity to be involved with 4-H and to:

Learn life skills

Increase self-esteem

Have fun

A secondary objective is to develop parent/child relationships through educational programming that parents/guardians can do with their children.

Parents/guardians are expected to be involved with Cloverbud members. Their involvement will enhance the development of the parent/child relationship and decrease the opportunity for the program to become a babysitting service.

Cloverbuds do not enroll in a state or county project, other than the Cloverbud project. When they enter the Fair they may bring their creative projects that they have worked on during the current 4-H year.

Colorado State University 4-H Youth Development program does not allow youth under the age of eight to participate in large animal activities and projects or shooting sports activities and projects. However, exploration activities where youth under age eight do not have contact with animals or firearms are acceptable. These might include reading about, studying and observing animal behavior and events, or about shooting information and observing events.

The Cloverbud Project is a non-competitive membership opportunity. Cloverbuds will be interviewed, judged and awarded a certificate at the Cloverbud Fair to be held the Saturday prior to the Arkansas Valley Fair.

When entering the fair please specify on the Fair Entry Form what the child is bringing to the Fair or if they will be participating in the Fashion Revue. (Example: Cookies, Decorated Cake, Cat, etc.)

Thank you, letters will need to be written and turned into the Extension Office by the official Arkansas Valley Fair thank-you deadline to receive a trophy. Parents or older siblings may assist Cloverbuds with thank you.

4-H FAMILY CONSUMER SCIENCES AND GENERAL EXHIBITS

General Rules

1. This division is open to exhibitors who are regularly enrolled members in 4-H Family Consumer Sciences and General Projects by the Arkansas Valley Fair eligibility deadline for the current year.
2. E-Records and supplements, if needed, will be required. Member's 4-H records may be either in pencil, ink, typewritten or computerized – your choice will not affect judging. Content is the consideration in judging.
3. All 4-H Family Consumer Science projects and General projects, except Fashion Revue, and dogs will be interview judged on the Saturday prior to the Arkansas Valley Fair. Every effort should be made to participate in interview judging. Interviews will be between judge and 4-Her only. Members not participating in interview judging will not be eligible to be Champion or any of the special awards nor will their project be eligible to go to the State Fair. Due to a health issue or a 4-H related conflict, an exhibitor may request permission from the CSU 4-H Extension Agent for a taped interview. This must be requested by July 31st of the current year.
4. A schedule for the interview judging will be mailed out in advance and posted on the County Website.
5. All projects will be on display at the Arkansas Valley Fair. Projects will be left at the Exhibit Hall and put on display by the Superintendents to be viewed by the public.
6. The American Judging System will be used placing exhibits first through tenth place. Top 3 places in each class will receive premiums. A project receiving unit champion or reserve champion and project grand champion or reserve grand champion will receive all ribbons accordingly. No Champions or Reserve Champion will be awarded if it is not worthy.
7. The decision of the judge will be final in all instances.
8. The judge may request that the member demonstrate any of the skills learned in any particular unit.
9. Release time for exhibit will be published in the July and August Newsletters and posted at the fair. No exhibits will be released before the posted time. All exhibits must be picked up at the indicated time. If you cannot pick up your project, arrange for someone else to do so. The Arkansas Valley Fair, CSU Extension and Otero County will not be responsible for your projects.
10. Members enrolled in more than one unit of the same project may exhibit in all units enrolled except where otherwise indicated.
11. The Arkansas Valley Fair, CSU Extension and Otero County will not be responsible for loss or

damage to exhibits while on display, though it will use all care to ensure their safety.

12. Each County is allowed to send only one exhibit in each unit of Family Consumer Science and General Projects to State Fair. All entries must be approved by an Extension Agent. ALL PROJECTS GOING TO STATE FAIR (except foods) must be in the Extension Office by the designated deadline. Foods projects are due by the specific Food Project deadline. 4-H members are responsible for packaging projects. If projects are not packed properly, the project will not go to the State Fair. Transportation of over-sized projects (i.e. woodworking or tiered cakes) will need to be coordinated through the extension office.

13. All parts of the exhibit and record book must be labeled with exhibitor name, county, age and Unit of display.

14. Age Divisions are based on age on or before December 31, of the previous year.

Junior – ages 8-10

Intermediate – ages 11-13

Senior – 14 and over

Unless otherwise indicated, requirements for Junior, Intermediate and Senior exhibits are the same.

15. Exhibits may not be shown more than 1 year.

16. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the unit in which they are exhibiting.

Young Homemaker Award

The exhibitor with the highest total points received in Family Consumer Science projects will be eligible for:

Sr: Young Homemaker Award-\$100 Cash Award Connect for Health Colorado

Jr: Young Homemaker Award-\$100 Cash Award Jimmy & Sally Cope

4-H members may win this honor only twice as a junior and twice as a senior.

Overall Home Economics Award – the County Fair Judge’s score sheet will be used for the tie breaker. The number of Excellent, Good and Poor marks received will be used to break the tie.

Scoring will be as follows:

Reserve Grand Champion	5 points
Unit Champion	4 points
Unit Reserve Champion	3 points
1 st Place	2 points
2 nd Place	1 point

Projects that are eligible for points toward this award are: Foods, Clothing Construction, Upcycle Your Style, Heritage Arts, Home Design & Decor, and Cake Decorating.

Note: Food items that show signs of mold growth or need refrigeration would not be safe to eat at time of judging and will not be accepted.

Bacon is not acceptable in baked goods because the heat during the cooking process might not penetrate the meat thoroughly enough. Large pieces or chunks of cheese on or in recipes where there is a large proportion of cheese is not acceptable either.

Include a copy of the recipe used and attach securely to the e-Record. No commercial mixes are to be used for the base of the product. Example: boxed cake mixes for shortened cake or quick breads, cookie dough -boxed or frozen, etc. If the commercial mix is an added ingredient to the product, it is ok.

Members may exhibit in one or all classes from the unit that they are enrolled in. Each exhibit will need an e-record.

FASHION REVUE & TALENT SHOW

FASHION REVUE:

1. Narration cards are required for Fashion Revue. These are due in the Otero County Extension Office by August 1, 2026.
2. The date and time of the Fashion Revue contest and Public Revue will be announced in the monthly newsletter. Contestants are required to attend both the judging and public viewing.
3. Judging will be done by class. Members will approach the judge one at a time to be judged. The judge may ask the member to turn, walk, etc. Each class will then be viewed by the judge as a group. Judge may call back garments as needed for a second viewing to select top awards.
4. There will be 2 judges, and they will judge as a team on all entries.
5. Fashion Revue judging and Clothing Construction judging will be evaluated separately.
6. All Clothing Construction, Decorate Your Duds, Creative Sewing, and Heritage Arts members are encouraged to participate in this Revue, however, participation is not required to complete the project.
7. All garments and accessories modeled in the fashion revue must be completed.
8. An "outfit" shall consist of no more than 3 pieces.
9. If a person is entered in more than one division within STEAM 1, 2 or 3, the same outfit may not be worn for more than one division or STEAM (i.e. a blouse worn with a suit in STEAM 3 Synthetics and Rayon cannot be modeled in STEAM 3 Wool and Wool Blend unless it is accompanied by a different skirt).
10. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior divisions.
11. A committee will be selected annually to select a theme, stage decorations, music, etc. for the public revue.
12. The Senior Grand Champion and Senior Reserve Grand Champion model will be eligible to go to the State Fair.
13. Judging will be based on the following considerations:
 - A. Preparation:
 1. Design and Style are suited to the individual
 2. Fabric and Color are suitable for the individual and garment
 3. Overall appearance of the outfit
 4. Accessories: appropriateness
 5. Grooming
 - B. Presentation:
 1. Appropriate for the garment style
 2. Movement: Ease in walking, standing and turning
 3. Poise/Posture: Head up, graceful, confident
 4. Variety in movement, use of space, creativity
 5. Attitude and enthusiasm

14. Points above are guidelines only. Numerical scores will not be given. The judges will make the final decision.

SHOOTING SPORTS COMPETITION

A Shooting Sports Competition will be held for each unit. Members must shoot the day designated for the contest. No special sessions will be allowed. An exhibitor may request permission for an exception from the CSU Extension 4-H Agent due to health or 4-H related conflict.

RULES:

1. Competitors must be currently enrolled in 4-H Shooting Sports project.

Every competitor **MUST** possess a valid Colorado Hunters Education Card, regardless of the competition category. A photocopy of the Colorado Hunters Education Card must be on file at the Extension Office before any shooting is allowed.

2. To compete in the Shooting Sports Competition a member must have proof of meeting the safety training requirements. **A member must attend two range safety meetings with an authorized leader and must demonstrate that they are proficient in the safety rules and practices.**

3. The Certified Shooting Sports Leader will sign the member's shooting record when these requirements are met.

4. Refer to the State 4-H Shooting Sports Rule Book for specific details regarding equipment, ammunition, and classes of shooting sport competition.

5. A Parent or legal guardian **MUST** be present for the 4-Her to shoot. ****If a parent or legal guardian cannot be there, a letter SIGNED by the parent or legal guardian stating who is responsible for the person shooting **MUST** be turned into the office prior to the event.**

6. No member will be allowed to shoot at an Otero County 4-H sponsored event without a Certified Shooting Sports Leader certified in that discipline present.
