- 1. Global Relations: Work to promote awareness and enthusiasm for international Extension programs among Zeta Chapter members.
- 2. Scholarships, Grants, and Recognition: Consider and encourage nominations for chapter, regional, and national awards; select the best awards applications; and submit entries to the National Executive Director and arrange for presentation of award(s).
- 3. Membership Recruitment and Retention: Work to recruit members for new, active, and life membership.
- 4. Professional Development: Solicit proposals for concurrent presentations and/or workshops at the National Meeting and the Chapter level. Approve the distribution of professional development funds that Zeta Chapter has available for its members.
- 5. Public Issues: Keep membership informed as to public issues and legislation affecting Extension.
- 6. Bylaws: Review and update (as needed) the National constitution and bylaws, National Council minutes, and Zeta Chapter bylaws for consistency.
- 7. Nominating: Solicit nominations for potential officers from membership.
- 8. Resource Development and Management: Monitor ESP funds and make recommendations regarding use of funds. Review all accounts for accuracy and completeness prior to the annual business meeting.
